NR 40, DEC. 29, 1965
Attention DXers. K1YPE/XV5 is now operating from Viet Nam with the express authority of the local government. FCC, therefore, will have no objection to United States amateurs working this station within the framework permitted by the Viet Nam authorities. Additionally, FCC has forwarded information stating the K1YPE/XV5 has received permission to handle third party traffic.

NR 41, Jan 6, 1966
February presents an excellent opportunity for every amateur to test his frequency measuring skills by taking part in an ARRL Frequency Measuring Test. W1AW will transmit signals for measurement on February 11 at 0230 and 0530 GMT. This will be the evening of February 10 at 2130 EST on approximately 3514 7060 and 14,085 Kc. A second series of test signals will be transmitted three hours later on about 3524 7085 and 14,147 Kc. Each participant will receive an individual report comparing the accuracy of his measurements with those of a professional frequency measuring laboratory. Further FMT details will appear on page 94 of February QST.

Project Oscar Headquarters continues to provide data on Oscar Four equatorial crossings. Orbital information is also carried by W1AW on its regular bulletin schedule. We learned that K3EOD, Paul, was on for a short time, and received his log in time to mail to ARRL with the others. His score boosted ours from 624,261 to 624,549. It changed our log received report from 92 to 93, and our member participation from 89 to 90.

EXCERPT FROM LETTER ACCOMPANYING SCORES TO ARRL:

"Also, the club would like to take this opportunity to make a few recommendations concerning the contest log sheets and the use of different time. In reverse order, the club feels that a lot of confusion results from the use of GMT in what is largely a local affair. Why not use local time entirely.

(Editor's note: I wholeheartedly agree with this. The contest rules do say, 'LOCAL STANDARD TIME', so why put GMT on the log sheet. In copying Frankie's log sheets, I noticed that half of those using GMT do not know how to make the change. Some used 2 hours, some 3 hours and one even used 7 hours. There is only 5 hours difference.)

"In the matter of contest log sheets, it centers around the division of space. Insufficient space has been allotted to the column for the station being worked, while space has been given to the home station and the home station's section, which is not needed. The new calls, such as WA and WB prefixes are difficult to record....."

(Editor's Note: Once again I am wholeheartedly in agreement. Take a look at the log sheet. At the top of each side you must record your call letters and section. To allow columns for them on the log sheet is pure nonsense.)

HOW TO WORK SS FOR THIRTY HOURS

Holds up XYL by bringing down check-off sheets and spreading them all over the table. When asked to do it upstairs pretend not to hear. OM decides to get dressed at 4:15 P.M.

TWO METER ACTIVITY

Now that the contest is a thing of the past it is time to move on to bigger and better things in VHF, but before sweeping the slate clean, it pays to take stock and make a few notes on ways to improve the station for next year. Now is the time all mistakes and goofs are fresh in mind and can be corrected easily. Those things put off until later may come back to haunt us next year. I said us because I have a few in my shack that I have been putting off also.

Two meters during the contest this year was not exactly ideal, but, as usual, a few nice sections were available to almost all the gang with a little effort. W8AEC was on CW on the low end for most of Sunday morn. Who needs WVA? K4SUM was up above 145 most of the afternoon and evening for a Virginia contact and there were several other fours as well. All NY sections were heard at various times with very good signal level. Many Conn. stations were heard but many of them weak. W. Mass. was in weak but faded out after working NNJ station. This was not a year for New England stations by any means. This is a good time to resolve to get the rig on CW, and to work on that general class ticket for most of the goodies were on CW in the lower MC. No QRM down there to speak of either!

After a contest the subject of antennas is heard on the air frequently. Most planning and conjecture about how to get higher gain and faster and more accurate rotation. The matter of rotation is mostly one of the wallet unless you happen to have a machine shop handy. The subject of gain does have a few more angles. Anyone who visited the field day site will recall our two meter antenna built by W2EIF for not more than a few bucks, I'm sure. Check around fellows, you don't have to spend fifty bucks to get a good antenna. Also keep in mind that there are no miracles in this area for antenna gain. Bear in mind that manufacturers are in the business of selling products and have been known to take liberties with the truth on occasion! And sometimes more often, also. Reports of on the air performance from a new owner of a super-blooper 88 are also not too reliable it turns out. The ARRL Antenna and the Handbook are all good sources of info, and while at times they appear to be telling only part of the story, very little misleading info will be found in them.

STATE SUPREME COURT RULES AGAINST RADIO HAM'S 54-FOOT TOWER

W3HJ--of Lancaster--may have to go off the radio amateur band or else operate on reduced signal strength.

This is the effect of a Pennsylvania Supreme Court decision yesterday that ruled its 54-foot antenna tower mast violated a deed restriction in "Golden Acres" where W3HJ lives.

W3HJ is William E. Hough, Jr., a veteran radio ham, who was the object of a lawsuit brought by his neighbors who didn't like his concrete-based antenna which cranked up from 22 feet to a 54-foot triangular steel tower.

Hough went to the Supreme Court to fight an adverse decision by the Lancaster County Court that his adjustable lattice mast violated deed restriction at "Golden Acres".

SPECIAL COUNSEL

His case was pressed by the American Radio Relay League, Inc., of Newington, Conn., representing 80,000 of the nation's 271,000 ham radio operators.

This was the first case of its kind in the country, according to the radio group. (First case to go to a State Supreme Court, Ed.)

Special legal counsel from Washington, D.C. was brought in to help defend Hough's position.

But the Supreme Court said "No."

Chief Justice John C. Bell, Jr., writing for a unanimous (That's the way it is spelled in the article) court, agreed with the Lancaster County jurist who found the tower "unsightly and objectionable."

FUNDAMENTAL RIGHT

With certain exceptions--and there are many--Chief Justice Bell said "an owner of property in this Commonwealth has a tremendously prized and fundamental Constitutional right to use his property as he pleases."

This, he said, is an unalienable constitutional right so long as he does not violate "any covenant, restriction or easement."

He upheld the lower court's view that Hough's antenna did just that.

WORD CAN'T BE STRETCHED

A novel argument by Hough was that the word "etc" in the deed permitted such structures as radio towers.

"The word 'etc'," said the chief justice "can not possibly be stretched to mean or include a 50-foot high radio tower."

It can not be equated with such permissible structures as a "small tool house, playhouse, outdoor fireplace—not exceeding 12 feet in height," observed Chief Justice Bell.

In fact, said Bell, "we find no merit in any of appellant's (Hough's) contentions."

Sochum, Germany, Jan. 19----(UP)--

The West German Institute for Satellite and Space Research reported it had discovered a second group of sunspots not far from a cluster observed Sunday. The spots will probably cause further disruption of shortwave radio transmissions around the world, the institute said.

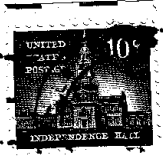
