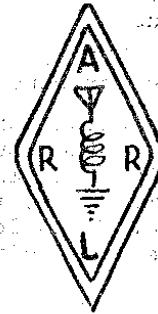

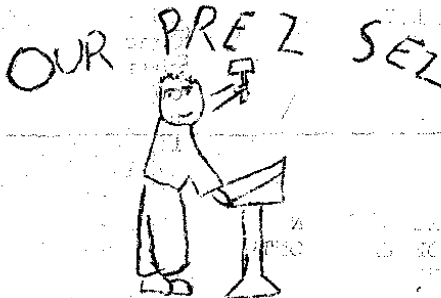

NR 190, October 10, 1968

Concurrent with the October 27 shift to standard time throughout the country, WLAW will adopt new code practice and bulletin frequencies. The new channels will be easy to remember at 20 kiloHertz above the lower band or segment edge. Effective October 27, WLAW code practice and code bulletins will take place on 1820 3520 7020 14020 21020 28020 50020 and 144120 kiloHertz. WLAW voice bulletins will be transmitted on 1820 3820 7220 14220 21270 28520 50120 and 144120 kiloHertz. Regular contacts will continue to take place on current WLAW frequencies. "Dear Paul:

I am most interested in your Book Review Program. Unfortunately, I cannot listen to the "on the air" review and would like to suggest a technical monthly review in CHEESE BITS. I have purchased many desirable publications from the Book Review and feel quite confident that your Reviews would be most informing." Signed Jay O. Achenbach

Many thanks Jay...we'll be doing this column regularly...and to satisfy all tastes, including the XYL...we'll be reviewing non-technical books as well. Joe Kilgore, W2EIF, will have done an on the air review by the time you read this but, we feel that whether you heard it or not you will be interested in seeing the printed review.

Title: TRANSISTOR CIRCUIT GUIDEBOOK (TAB BOOK #470), Author: Byron G. Wels, Price: \$4.95 paper \$6.95 hardbound, Pages: 224, 13 Sections, 104 Circuits

Here's a handy reference and guide to all types of solid-state circuits - how they work, where they are used, unusual features, etc. Amateurs and hobbyists will find many made-to-order circuits for the ham shack and home. In fact, regardless of a reader's niche in the world of electronics he will find this collection of transistor and solid-state circuits of value.

This is not a primer on the solid-state art since it also includes a collection of both basic and advanced circuits covering the principal fields of electronics. Each circuit is accompanied by a brief description of how it works, with notations of unusual features and applications. Part lists, component specifications, coil data, etc., are also included for the home-brew devotee. This big collection of 104 circuits includes AM/FM tuners and receivers which use transistors, FET's, and MOS FET's...amplifiers for stereo, telephone, PA...timers, time delays, temperature indicators, grid dip oscillators, special signal generators, power and speed controls, servo controls, heat controls, light flasher, SCR light switches and dimmers, light activated switch, transceiver, wireless phone oscillator, sonobuoy transmitter, marine band xmtr, freq. doubler, FET VFO, linear RF amplifier,

stereo balancer, intercom system, audio mixer, BFO, short wave converter, inverters noise limiter, auto transistored ignition system, battery charger, differential amplifiers, shift register or ring counter, bistable multivibrator, decimal counter...power converters, electronic flash and a complete color TV receiver circuit and parts list. And, of course, much more.

Some of the upcoming books to be reviewed on/or off the air will also include: The Executioners (The Story of SMERSH...a true story, not a 007 mystery) by Ronald Seth; Electronics Hobbyist's IC Projects Handbook; FET Applications Handbook, Working with the Oscilloscope (a dandy!); Handbook of Semicinductors Circuits; One Thousand Inspirational Things; The Popular Mechanics Home Book of Electrical Wiring and Repair.

Of one fact you may be sure...there will be books of interest to everyone...check in the NET...but listen to the weekly reviews...and read this column each month.

The location for this hunt was about two miles southeast of Furlong, Pennsylvania. The transmitters were hidden on the grounds of the Bonnie Brook Farm, a riding academy where my youngest daughter keeps her four-legged friend.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE MT. AIRY V.H.F. RADIO CLUB, INC.

Submitted By K3IUV

1. ARTICLE III, Section 4

From: (4) Each membership application shall be submitted at a regular meeting of this club. Unanimous consent of all members present shall be necessary for approval of any prospective member. A minimum of ten (10) members shall constitute a quorum for consideration of applications.

To: (4) In order to be eligible for a vote, each membership application shall have been read at a previous regular meeting of this club, and the prospective member's name shall have been advertised in the club paper. The vote shall be taken by written ballot, and unanimous consent of all members voting shall be necessary for approval of any prospective member.

2. ARTICLE III, Section 5, Part 1

From: 1. Member - He shall meet all the requirements of membership as prescribed in the Constitution.

To: 1. Member - He shall meet all the requirements of membership as prescribed in the Constitution, and shall pay the full regular dues.

3. ARTICLE III, Section 5, Part 2

From: 2. A retired member will pay \$3.00 a year dues and

To: 2. A retired member will pay one half of the regular yearly dues and

4. ARTICLE III, Section 5, Part 3

From: 3. A student member will pay \$1.00 a year dues and

To: 3. A student member will pay one fourth of the regular yearly dues and

5. ARTICLE VIII, MEETINGS. Add New Sections 3 and 4 as Shown Below:

(3) Unless otherwise indicated, a quorum for conducting normal business shall consist of 30% of the regular members.

(4) The rules contained in "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the club in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws, or the special rules of order of this club. When required, the presiding officer may override "Robert's Rules of Order".

The above amendments are offered to clarify and update the Constitution.

The motion to increase dues for 1969 from \$6.00 to \$8.00 per year was passed at the October meeting. There were 38 of a possible 47 affirmative votes.

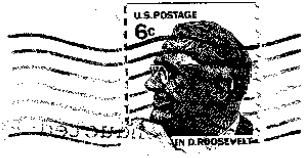
