The 10 GHz Minimum Discernable Signal Testing.

<u>Preparation.</u> Gary WA2OMY and Dave K1RZ thought it would be great if we could also do a Minimum Discernable Signal (MDS) Test for Pack-Rat 10 GHz portable operators. Gary took the lead on designing, fabricating, testing the RF Sources for both 5.7 and 10 GHz, including the ability to vary the 10 GHz signal level by 1 dBm. This allowed each operator to determine his overall weakest copiable signal - their MDS. This MDS test gave these operators the benchmark needed to optimize their systems, to perform to meet the long distance requirements in the August and September 10 GHz and Up Distance Contest weekends.

<u>Test Range Plan.</u> Gary found that the Senior Center had appropriate real estate to put the RF

Sources out by Delmont Avenue with a 350 ft range back to a small ridge just behind the back door of the meeting room, where the 10 GHz operator could line up to point their dishes and horns at the RF Sources.

The MDS Test Range Umpire was new PackRat member Eric, WG3K, who scored the event by confirming he could still hear the current Source signal strength at each operator's radio.

MDS Summary. Gary WA2OMY at the RF Source coordinated with Umpire Eric WG3K who was with the MDS Testers at the far end of the range. Eric listened to each operator's radio to verify each operator had a copy able CW signal in his radio at every signal level. When an operator could no longer copy the signal Eric logged the previous level that operator could copy as his systems MDS, as shown in the MDS column above. This MDS Test process was conducted very efficiently and took about an hour to complete with the Umpire working up and down the line of participants, and the RF source being adjusted lower and lower in measured steps. At the end Steve K3WHC, Dave K1RZ and Paul WA3GFZ were tied for lowest MDS. And as a result several operators have since connected with each other to help each other make system improvements in their gear. Everyone reported they learned a lot about using each of their systems through this test. And in the end, we all had FUN.

He also thanked our perennial auctioneer El. **K3JJZ** for his help during last month's auction held at the home of Dave, **W3ZD**. And he closed by including a cryptogram at the end of his column (a not uncommon item in Cheese Bits of that era.) I'll repeat it here for those that like a challenge: QXF'A FBA-0BEW! EXNU AX AKU OBE-FBE! -TFXF (/ didn't try this one, so you are on your own.)

Calendar of Events. August 11, the annual Packrat picnic at the Ft Washington State Park, with "many new games and surprises in store." "Good" door prizes for the ladies and OMs. August 15, club meeting at the QTH of Doc. K3GAS. Featured will be slides, films and pictures taken from the Packrat archives (Note that Jim, WA3EHD has undertaken the massive task of digitizing and identifying well over a thousand slides that have been carefully preserved. They will be available for online viewing and enjoyment.) September 19, White Elephant sale at the QTH of Joe Ruston, W3YXF. The Packrat Hamarama is scheduled for

October 6, at the Bucks County Drive-in Theater. (*another "thing that isn't there anymore.*")

New Products of Interest to Hams.

W3NSI, Lynn somehow always managed to find at least 3 interesting new items. This issue ncluded: 1).HeathKit HA201, a 10-watt amplifier for 2 meters to boost your 1-watt to 10 watts. Price for the kit is \$25.95. 2). **PAGEL model 6** UHF counter operates from 10 Hz to 500 MHz and has a 6digit display. Operates from 115 vac or a 12-volt battery. Price \$495 (ouch). 3).Multicore Solders announced their **ALU-SOL**, the first aluminum solder for use with normal procedures. The flux residue is non-corrosive. No price given. 4) Rohde & Schwarz is now importing a very fine general coverage receiver, the EK56. The unit is fully transistorized and may be used for CW, AM, SSB and FM reception. Interest may be confined to only a few hams, since the advertised price is \$24,000 per unit!! (double ouch.)

VHF Report. Joe, W2EIF noted that six meters has been very good this summer, with openings to the West Coast and Central America. TI2NA as well as several TG stations were worked in our area. On two meters, the July 4th weekend offered one of the best auroras in several years. It lasted from Thursday night through early Saturday. The best DX reported to Joe was K1WHS working a station in 7 land. And W1YTW in Maine reportedly heard aurora activity on 432 MHz.

This is Your Life (Part #1, The Packrats are born). In this issue, Frankie, W3SAO started to present the history of the Packrats. How, when, and why they started. For the current younger members, this is an excellent way to see our history. For the remaining "older" members, it can be a good review. I recommend you read the full details in the issue scanned and posted on our website. Look under the "Newsletter" tab and enjoy this bit of history. I won't try to synopsize it here, other than to say the first meeting was held on May 15, 1956.

Official Bulletin Nr 491 from ARRL.July 11, 1974. The ARRL announced that the threat to our 420-450 MHz band has been overcome. After receipt of the ARRL's comments, the FCC has denied the request to move several frequencies in this range to Medical Radio paging. (*We need to be eternally vigilant*.)

Official Bulletin Nr 492 from ARRL. July

- 18, 1974. The **FCC** has issued three more rule changes affecting the amateur service. Automatically controlled repeaters will be permitted to operate under certain conditions without a control operator present. The crossband operation of repeaters will be allowed. And special short-term licenses may be issued to commemorative stations.
- Membership. Application for membership received from WA3NDE, Hy Ecksel. Voted to membership was K3MWV, Richard Pierce in Newportville.
- Tidbits. W2AXU, W2EIF and W3CL visited the Clegg labs in Lancaster on July 16. The Packrat repeater is temporarily off the air. FM-21 units are now in stock at Hamtronics. There were over 70 visitors at our July auction. 10 Packrats attended the recent ARRL National Convention in New York City.

Critique of the National Convention. An interesting evaluation and critique of the National Convention in NYC was authored by Pete, **WA3OVH**. There were a lot of negative items noted. But also, a lot of positive suggestions for improvements. This would be useful reading for anyone planning a similar event. Two full pages of comments were included. (*See the details on our web site*.)

Technical Topic – FM21 Power Supply. A schematic and parts list for a small power supply was contributed by Ron, W3RJW. Suitable for the FM-21 Clegg rig or similar unit, the supply provided a regulated 12-vdc output of 2 amps.

Technical Topic – Battery Isolator. A schematic and parts list showing a technique for adding a second car battery for HAM rigs was reprinted from the "Sara Slip" newsletter. A simple arrangements of power diodes provided isolation and prevented discharging the regular car battery.

And a penny postcard now costs 56-cents!) As usual, many other "folksy" comments about members, their families, and activities were included in this edition of Cheese Bits. 

SEQ-3 Sequencer



Our Sequencers, SEQ1 and SEQ2, have proven quite popular and we have sold almost all that have been made. But we discovered a small problem with the original design that caused a random time delay when activating or releasing the PTT line. The delay is not very noticeable except when using slow sequence rates. But we felt that this required a new design. The new design uses an interrupt driven microprocessor that instantly responds to changes on the PTT input.

Savings on board cost and component reduction have allowed us to reduce the price from the original \$67 to \$59 for the new SEQ3.

Kenwood TS-2000 services

We are now able to offer some limited repair service for owners of the venerable Kenwood TS-2000 transceiver.

- 1. Repair failed back lighting of the digital display, by installing LED lights (with necessary circuit changes).
- 2. Replace old backup battery.
- 3. Adjust master oscillator to be within 20 Hz of correct frequency on 2 meters. (for higher bands the error will be greater due to increased drift with fan operation).
- 4. Fan Modifications.
- 5. Fix incorrect 1296 MHz output module bias, in early models.
- Fixing other faults, details to be worked out, but on a case-by-case basis.




