SPORATIC `E' on 6 METERS

Frank Donovan, W3LPL of Glenwood, Maryland sent in some interesting web links regarding six meters and sporadic-E propagation. The links are http://k1six.com/eh7kw_bydate.htm. On the k1six.com link, the dates may be a bit confusing, because the title says the graph covers the period from 1995 to present, but the dates along the x-axis run from early May to the present. This graph shows cumulative activity during May through August over the past decade, so the data isn't just from this year. It illustrates when sporadic-E propagation across the Atlantic is the most common, in late June and early July.

NE3I June Rover

Thanks for the kind remarks about our rovers. I wish that other commitments had not delayed my start.

The rover "coordination" was 100% improved this year. Whenever I called in, I received a positive reaction and encouraging response from Bill, John, Paul, Joe, Phil or whoever was operating or moving rovers back and forth between our operating positions.

Sorry that I did not have time to drop by and



see the set up or provide a laser Q. However, the decision to head west instead proved to be the correct one as I was able to work W3CCX from FN00 and then get to FN01 before dark. This turned out to be especially important, since I found the site gated. No bowinkle this year but bambi dropped by.

Signals were strong at the FN01 site. If anyone can remember, I am curious if my signal was just at the noise level or decent. I received some good reports. I was only using 4 el and 25 watts on 2, 5 el and 10 watts on 220, 8 el and 25 watts on 432, 10 watts

and 10 el on 903 and 10 watts and 14 loops on 1296. Antennas were between about 7-10 feet above ground and only separated by about 6 inches each on a wooden mast.



I spent at least 6 of my 12 hours traveling. Managed to work 70 plus Qs, 9 on 1296 and 7 on 903 and will have to let you know how many grids later. The only FN20 contacts I had were with Joe, W3KJ on all bands. That was different.



Things also got a little exciting in FN11 when a state trooper knocked on my window, asked "Can I help you sir?" and then advised that parking was not allowed along the side of the interstate.

DIRECTOR/VICE DIRECTOR ELECTIONS SET IN THREE ARRL DIVISIONS

There will be contested elections for ARRL Director and Vice Director seats in three divisions for terms beginning next January 1. In two other divisions, the incumbent Director and Vice Director are running unopposed and have been declared elected. Balloting for Director will occur in the Atlantic, Great Lakes and Midwest divisions. Balloting for Vice Director will take place in the Atlantic and Great Lakes divisions.

In the Atlantic Division: Current Vice Director William C. Edgar, N3LLR, faces a challenge from Scott J. Bauer, W2LC, for the Director's seat. The winner will succeed Bernie Fuller, N3EFN, who is not seeking reelection to another term. Competing to replace Edgar on the back bench are Maryland-DC Section Manager Thomas J. Abernethy, W3TOM, and Thomas G. Valosin, WB2KLD.

In the Great Lakes Division: Incumbent Director James E. Weaver, K8JE, is being challenged for reelection by Neil Sablatzky, K8IT. Running for Great Lakes Division Vice Director are Daniel M. Romanchik, KB6NU, and former Great Lakes Division Vice.

Director Gary L. Johnston, KI4LA. Current Vice Director Richard Mondro, W8FQT, has decided not to run for another term

In the Midwest Division: Incumbent Director Wade Walstrom, W0EJ, is being opposed for reelection by Harry S. Nordman, AB0SX. Vice Director BruceFrahm, K0BJ, is unopposed.

Both incumbent Directors and Vice Directors are unopposed in the Dakota and Delta divisions. Dakota Director Jay Bellows KOQB, and Vice Director Twila Greenheck, NOJPH, have been declared elected, as have Delta Director Rick Roderick, K5UR, and Vice Director Henry Leggette, WD4Q.

Ballots will go out by October 1 to all full ARRL members on record as of September 10, 2005, in the Atlantic, Great Lakes and Midwest divisions. The deadline to receive completed ballots at ARRL Headquarters is noon Eastern Time Friday, November 18, 2005.

Any member entitled to a ballot and who has not received one by November 1 should request a duplicate ballot from the Secretary, ARRL, 225 Main St, Newington, CT 06111.




