





Comment and Analysis of the January ARRL VHF SS Team Competition

We set out in November to divide the club into three regional teams to improve participation and encourage a bit of inter-team competition within the regional groupings. As it turned out, the completion was close. The three teams turned in the following totals: 676,672; 633,796; and 628,852. Now for a little color commentary. . Since it would be difficult to place the multi-op efforts of the big N3NGE group in a competition, they stood alone with a 538,425 point entry.

The K3TUF team had the additions of W3HMS and KF3DO, both of whom were not on the list from 2011. They lost the KB3BBR score because Sarah was not able to participate this year. Most all of the participants showed a "usual" or increased score, with the exception of WA3YUE, whose participation was time limited.

With his new tower and antennas, K3TUF made up for any losses with an increase in his submitted score by 119,000 points.

The K1DS team missed the participation of W3RJW, K3DMA and K3EBZ. K3IPM boosted the team by adding an extra 45,000 points over his score in 2011 due to the nice 6m conditions and an improved rotor cage. Big increases over last year were also made by WA3EHD, WA3SRU, W3ICC, KA3WXV, AA3JH and KB1JEY.

The WB2RVX grouping had the problems with some bad weather and antenna icing, flu-like illness and the loss of some big stations including W2SJ, WC2K, KB3XG and W3OR. They did however have the added scores from WN3A, K2WB and W2MC. A big boost from KC2TN's new tower and antennas, and a huge jump by N3RG with his newer microwave capabilities, breaking into the 6 figure club.

The K3EOD multi-op had a high score of 143K Nice increases were noted for K3JJZ, N3YMS and especially WA2OMY.

So what were the win, place and show

teams? The Central team, headed by K1DS scored first place, with the NJ and associates in second place, and the K3TUF Regional team third. Did all this planning pay off? It appears that for several reasons it had very positive consequences. We submitted the most Packrat logs in recent history. Many stations broke their all-time personal scoring records. Microwave QSOs appeared to be on the increase. Everyone was able to take advantage of the good 6m openings.

The Wayback Machine

Gleaned from the pages of Cheese Bits, May, 1962 (Vol. V Nr. 2) (Authors comments in *italics*)

- This issue, 8 double-sided legal size pages, mailed for a 3 cent stamp.
- Cover page reports that the League congratulates us for celebrating the club's 6th Birthday (May 15, 1962). For the occasion, Ed Tilton, W1HDQ, VHF Editor of QST will be our speaker at the May meeting. (*Ed was referred to as Mr. VHF. Somewhere, I have a tape of his speech on VHF propagation. I'll try to find it for others to hear.*) Ed was to be joined by the Atlantic Division Assistant Director and the SCM.
- Helen bemoans the lack of committee and member articles for Cheese Bits. (Nothing new, Lenny has the same problem 50 yrs later!)
- A "Frequency Conversion Table" of 8-Mc crystals (War Surplus FT-243) to the 220 band was provided, courtesy of ALMO Radio's Ham publication (ALMO QSO) (ALMO formerly at 5th and Arch, now SK). Included in the list is the desirable 8200 MC crystal, which provided the 221.4 Club Intercom Frequency.
- ALMO also announced that they would be honoring a different radio club in the area each month. The selected club was to receive a certificate published in

ALMO's newsletter, as well as a gavel engraved with "ALMO Club of the Month". The club selected for June was the Packrats (I don't remember ever seeing that gavel. Does it still exist?)

- W3NSI in his new products column reports on the Clegg VHF Interceptor Receiver, "A Deluxe item for the serious VHF operator – with a price to match -- \$473". Operating on 6 and 2, the two-meter portion used seven Nuvistors.
- W3HKZ reported that the Conelrad (CONtrol of ELectromagnetic RADiation) system would be replaced soon by the Emergency Broadcast System (EBS). (*This in turn was replaced in 1997 by the Emergency Alert System, still in use today*). Conelrad was originally intended to prevent Soviet Bombers from homing in on American cities by using their broadcast station signals, and also to provide civil defense information. (*Seems primitive in the light of today's GPS navigation.*)
- A group of hams announced plans to attempt to bounce signals off the passive Echo A-12 satellite, a 135-ft inflatable sphere (aluminum foil surface) to be launched by NASA sometime in 1962. It was also noted that Hams have successfully bounced signals off the ionized trails of Explorer-7 and Sputnik-3 (*It would have been easier if they had WSJT back then*!)
- Six-meters: Jules, K3MSV reports that

a number of club members and other Hams used their mobile rigs to coordinate in a search for a missing 2½ year old boy on April 6. Sadly, the boy was finally found drowned in a nearby pool. (*Tragic ending that still happens today*). Jules also noted recent contacts with an Aeronautical mobile near Massachusetts, as well as other stations from Baltimore to Reading.

- Two-meters: Dave, W3LHF reports lots of Long Island activity, and Sunday morning inversion paths to New England. Dave also reports that a nice engraved certificate is available by working 10 out of the 15 members of the Windblowers Club (A North Jersey group. It must be defunct, as Googling the name now yields no results).
- SWAP & SHOPPE column shows a Measurements Corp Model 62 VTVM, offered for \$25, or swap for a grid dip meter or a prop pitch motor (sought after as an antenna rotator). Seller, yours truly, K3IUV!
- Armed Forces Day (5/19/1962) activities will include a CW and Teletypewriter Receiving competition for Amateurs. Perfect copy of the 25wpm cw transmission was required for the certificate, or the 60-wpm teletypewriter test.
- Packrats Family Day and Picnic announced for August 12. Fort Washington State Park, admission \$1.00 per family.
- Radio Pioneer F. Stanley Mockford, the man who originated the "MAYDAY

call died on March 1st. (Unless it is an urban legend, the call is the English pronunciation of the French "m'aidez" which translates as "help me".

 The June Contest Chairman, Frankie, W3SAO announced band captains as follows: 50, Joe, W3MXW; 144, Bob, W3GXB; 220, Jo, W2EIF; 432, Lyn, W3NSI; and 1296, Bert K3IUV. (Two of the five still active in the June test!)


STRAYS... Penn Wireless Association Announces Repeater Change


