OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 741 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CT JANUARY 18, 1979 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT: A 60 day extension of time in which to file comments in General Docket 78-365 has been granted by the FCC. This docket concerns the protection of FCC monitoring stations from radio interference. It is covered in detail in Feb. 1979 QST. The new comment deadline is March 22, 1979. On a new subject, OSCAR 8 experiments using combined modes A and J are to be conducted on Jan. 24, 27, 28, 31 Feb. 3 & 4. The test is to evaluate NICAD recharge memory by forcing discharge of onboard batteries. During these days users will be permitted general operation and are asked to report unusual findings to ARRL headquarters. If the spacecraft is off during these periods that will indicate ground control selection of Mode D. On another matter an OSCAR DXpedition is pending and will be announced on periodic updates of the OSCAR bulletin.  $\overline{AR}$ .

### TECH STUFF

When tuning your VHF antenna for lowest SWR, do not make the mistake of putting the SWR bridge or FWD/RFD power meter very far from the antenna feedpoint. Losses in the feed-line can cause erroneous (most of the time optimistically low) SWR readings. Best thing to do is to connect the bridge to the antenna with a half wavelength (electrical) coax. For frequencies at 220 or 440 Mhz use a full electrical wavelength as it is easier to work with. Keep the bridge out of the plane of the antenna. Best to use 10 watts or less for tune-ups as most bridges give inaccurate SWR readings at higher power levels.

# SOLAR ECLIPSE OF FEBRUARY, 1979 By John B. Power, W2AXU

February 26, 1979, Monday, provides this last opportunity for Americans, U.S. and Canada, to view the last solar eclipse of the 20th Century within North America. For a small strip of the countries, the eclipse will be total. The rest will view a partial eclipse. Starting at the Pacific coast in Oregon and Washington, the moon will pass directly in front of the sun at approximately 8:12 A.M. P.S.T. (1612 UT). This narrow strip of totality will be across the Northwestern states into Canada across the Hudson Bay ending in Greenland at sunset. The maximum duration of the total phase will be 2 minutes 52 seconds just east of Lake W innipeg in Manitoba, Canada. The Philadelphia, New York, Washington area will view only the partial phase. New York will see 61% while Trenton, Philadelphia and Washington will view 60% of totality. The beginning and ending times are in the following table:

Times are in Universal Time. Subtract 5 hours for Eastern Standard Time.

The eclipse may be observed safely and comfortably if a few simple precautions are followed. Never, but never view the Sun without the proper eye protection. For naked-eye protection, one can use a welder's glass of Shade No. 12 to 14. These are obtainable at welding supply houses. An alternative is to use a double thickness of light-struck and fully developed black-and-white film as a filter. Smoked glass, photographic neutral-density filters, color film or sunglasses or any in combination are not safe and should never be used.

A very safe way to view the eclipse is by projection. A number of people can view it together this way. A pin hole in a window shade will cast an image on a far wall. The diameter of the image will be 0.9% of the distance from the pinhole, so that a distance of 9 feet will produce a one inch image.

Binoculars can be used to project the image of the sun onto a white cardboard. A telescope without the proper sun filter can be used for projection in the same manner as above. Another large image can be obtained by using a telescope, however, the larger the diameter, the dimmer the image will be. A small telescope will give a very satisfactory image. A piece of white cardboard supported behind the eyepiece is the projection screen. To place the screen in a shadow, a piece of cardboard, with a hole the diameter of the front end of the telescope, is slipped over the front end of the scope to produce a shadow at the rear.

The minimum density for a sun filter on a telescope or binoculars is No. 4 density. The light transmission is only .01 percent of the total. A sun filter should never be used at the eyepiece. Some small telescopes are sold with a socalled sun filter that screws into the eyepiece. This filter glass can crack due to the heat impingued upon the glass by the sun. Just the instant flash of magnified sunlight upon the eye can cause instant blindness. If your scope has such a filter, discard the filter so it can never be used accidentally.

We don't want a bunch of one-eyed "hams" running around. Enjoy the solar eclipse safely. It is one of nature's rare and beautiful events.

### TID BITS

From the ARRL Directors' Newletters of Dec. 28, 1978 and Jan. 18, 1979 the following:

The League announces a new QST Microwave Column by Bob Cooper, W5KHT beginning with the March issue.

Feb. QST article on INCONS (devices combining inductance and capacitance into one component) will be very useful items for the reduction of RFI.

' International broadcasting interests pose a threat to the high-frequency WARC proposals contained in the recent FCC Report and Order. The FCC and the National Telecommunications and information Administration (NTIA) of the Department of Commerce have recommended adoption of the proposals contained in the FCC document. Until recently, WARC delegation chairman Glen O. Robinson supported this view. Early this week, information reached us that Mr. Robinson was under pressure from superiors within the Department of State to make some additional accomodation for international broadcasting. The primary source of this pressure appears to be the Congressionally-funded Board for International Broadcasting (BIB), which operates Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty. Further investigation showed that this information was accurate, and that some countervailing action was required. On Monday, Sumner, Steinman , and I spent much of the day gathering information and putting across our position: further accompdation to international broadcasting, at the expense of the other services, is unthinkable at this stage of the preparations. After consultation with President Dannals, and after laying some groundwork in Washington, we took the unusual step of sending telegrams to President Carter, Secretary of Defense Brown, Secretary of Commerce Kreps, the returning members of the House Communications Subcommittee, and the Senate

Commerce Committee, Ambassedor Robinson, and the man to whom he reports, Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher. The telegram to President Carter is attached, and should explain the position we are taking. Our interests on this issue, incidentally, correspond to those of the Department of Defense, among others, with which we have maintained especially close liason this week.

While it is too early to know the ultimate outcome of this issue, it is quite probable that at minimum, the U.S. proposals will be delayed in getting to Geneva as a result of the BIB actions. Amateurs may want to keep this incident in mind later this year, when Congress reviews the annual appropriations request from BIB.


