

THE AVALON STORY

Shortly after the June 1970 V.H.F. Contest, Allen Katz, K2UYH, of the East Coast V.H.F. Society, suggested to Bert Soltoff, K3IUV, of the Mt. Airy V.H.F. Club, that the two clubs combine efforts for a 1296 expedition. The idea was that the East Coast group would be responsible for one end of the link and the Pack Rats would man and assemble the other. A meeting was held with many interested personnel of both clubs present. At the meeting it was decided that the first trial run would be made from Avalon, New Jersey to Fire Island, New York Long Island. The two points are approximately 175 airline miles apart.

The expedition was first planned for Saturday, August 15, but was later changed to Sunday, August 16. The following is an account of the Pack Rat portion of the expedition.

The Avalon location was chosen because W2EIF, Jo Kilgore, of the Pack Rats has a summer cottage on the inland waterway with a relatively clear shot toward Long Island.

Preparations for the expedition were in the capable hands of K3UJD, "atsa spicy meat ball Mario" transmitter expert; K3BPP, "Walt" the V.H.F. antenna and dish expert; K3IUV, "Bert" the converter, receiver, transmitter and cw keying expert; WA3NFV, "Dan" meter reader, tower climber, dish rotator, garter collector, and strong arm man; W3CJU, "Don" (our illustrious Vice President) who supplied transportation, map reading, somewhat meager control of WA3NFV, and loud snores during the sleeping hours.

W2EIF took off for Avalon at noon on Saturday, August 15, with the usual tools, aluminum ladder, clothes, sheets, beer, food, etc., arrived at cottage about 1:30 p.m., opened up the house, windows, turned on water and found refrigerator not working. Called service man - machine fixed two hours and fifty bucks later. Meanwhile K3UJD, Mario, pulled in with his wife Floss. She immediately took over and prepared a nice supper. Floss spent time practicing her golf swing by cutting down weeds in the yard. About 9:30 p.m. (very dark), W3CJU, Don pulled up in his station wagon. K3BPP, Walt and WA3NFV, Dan were with him. On the roof were two ten foot lengths of tower and a six foot aluminum dish. Nothing would do but get everything going immediately. (The mosquitos had gone over to Wildwood where targets were more plentiful.) Believe it or not everything was up and ready by 12:30 a.m., much to the consternation of local residents.

Having completed the set-up so quickly, everybody except W2EIF went over to Wildwood to "whoop it up" The gang returned at 4 a.m. with Dan carrying a ladies red garter. He claimed he removed it himself, but there is evidence that he bought it. After much discussion everybody got to sleep and were periodically awakened by Floss who was having a nightmare (she was reliving her experiences in Wildwood).

Everybody was up at 8 a.m., sleep or no sleep. There was breakfast for all and then got the 1296 gear all ready to go. Bert, K3IUV, arrived at 9:30 with wife and kids who hurried off to fish and swim. Jack, W2GQK, who lives about 75 yards away, came over and we went over to his house to make initial contact via Jack's 2 meter gear. No success at first with much help from W3ZD, Dave, and K2EFB, Guy from their home rigs. Finally at about 10:30 we heard WA2WEB/2 calling W3CCX/2 and Jack (W2GQK) went back and established contact.

THE AVALON STORY (Continued)

It didn't take long to get hooked up on 1296.1. We did have some trouble $\underline{\text{due}}$ to $\underline{\text{QRM}}$. K2JNG, 100 miles north on the Pallisades was clobbering WA2WEB/2 something fierce.

WA2WEB/2 was using a 4 foot dish, 12-15 feet above the beach and 100 watts output at 1296.1. The signal strength was unbelievable with the "S" meter pinned most of the time. Bert was keying and the key came apart and the ball bearings in it rolled through the porch cracks into the sand. The neighbors were wondering what Floss and Dan were doing under the porch pawing the sand!

W3CXX/3 was our call and we were using a 6 foot dish at 25 feet with about 100 watts out of the transmitter. WA2WEB/2 also had a 12 foot dish, which they tried later. They still pinned the "S" meter with the power reduced to 30 watts. They used CW, and later tried NBFM with fine rusults. The two meter links were as follows. W2GQK/2 10 watts output, corroded coaxial feed line and a Cushcraft beam at 45 feet. The east coast boys had a Clegg 22'er and a 9 element beam at 12-15 feet. 2 meter signals were good around 10 a.m. but deteriorated and at times they disappeared into the noise but adequate contact could be maintained. Finally a complete link was performed with WA2WEB/2 transmitting NBFM. It was relayed to W2GQK/2 via CB and retransmitted back to WA2WEB/2 via 2 meters. The tests were a complete success although there are some who believe that we were just lucky and hit a "duct" or other very favorable conditions. The crew at the other end (WA2WEB/2) were K2LRE, K2JWE, WB2IRX, WA2ZZF, K2OVS, and K2RIW.

Both clubs are to be congratulated for the cooperative effort that produced such gratifying results on the 1296 MHz band. If it serves no purpose other than to excite interest and promote new and renewed effort to get on 1296, it will be reward enough for those who participated in the expedition.

NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS W3NSI, Lyn Rowland

1. Solar Battery #HSB 9 - Centralab Semiconductor Division

These units (also available in 4.5 and 6 volts) were originally designed by Hoffman, which was then bought out by Centralab. It would find use in small experimental receivers or even transmitters for low power use. Designed for use with the shirt pocket 6 or 8 transistor radios, they produce about 25 Ma. The 2" x 3" panel contains a number of silicon cells wired in series as required.

2, Slug Tuned Coil - 25 Turn #69100 H (\$3.75) - James Millen Company

Just the thing for VFO or receiver tuning. A 1/4" shaft is brought out one end instead of the normal slug adjustment. It requires 25 turns of this shaft to move the slug in or out of the coil. The shaft does not move in or out, just turns. Two models are available. The #69100 is for use in the BC band up to about 3 Mc. The "H" version is for use up to about 30 Mc. Coil form is 1/2" D with a winding length of 1/2".

3. Micro Soldering Iron #WMCP (\$26.50) - Weller Electric Company

A bit expensive, but very interesting just the same. It has a solid state closed loop control system that automatically controls output and temperature. The control box has a sponge recess used to keep the tip clean. It contains the isolation low voltage transformer and control switch, also the iron holder. Fixed tip temperature is 650°F.

ARRL BULLETINS

NR 281, July 16, 1970

Amateurs using the 50 MHz band are asked to look for OX5AP, Thule, Greenland, who is making five minute transmissions on the hour, from 2200 to 0200 GMT daily. These transmissions are on 50.15 and will continue through this year, except for the period of August 5 through 14. He will listen for 6 meter signals in the five minutes after each test. OX5AP is available for 14 MHz schedules between 2100 and 1100 GMT. Please report any reception or two way communication on 50 MHz to ARRL $\overline{\rm AR}$

NR 283, July 30, 1970

New fees adopted by FCC on July 1 apply to applications on or after August 1, 1970. New upgraded, renewed or modified and renewed amateur licenses are now nine dollars. Four dollars is charged for straight modification such as change of station location. Special callsigns under section 97.51 require an additional twenty five dollars. No fee for any Novice, military recreation station or Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service authorization. August QST carries a brief announcement with details in the September issue. Meanwhile, ARRL, continuing its fight against fees, is preparing a formal request for reconsideration \overline{AR}

NR 285, August 13, 1970

The ARRL Intruder Watch is now into its sixth year of operation, with an impressive record of reports leading to intruders being removed from the amateur bands. Additional work and constant vigilance are necessary. Volunteers, with two or three years amateur experience and good receiving equipment, who can spend two hours a week logging the calls of non amateur stations in the amateur bands would be welcomed. 



Step by step instructions:


- 1. Locate the 2700 and the 100K ohm. res. connected to pin 6 of the 12AT7, cut the lead running from the junction of these resistors to the terminal of the electrolic cap.
- Locate and remove the lead of the 47k ohm res. at pin?,
 push it out of the way.
- 3. Connect a .015 cap. and a 820K ohm res. at pin 7.
- 4. GND. the 820K ohm res. at the nearest point.
- 5. Remove the bus wire which runs mertically on the terminal strip running along the side of the chassis.
- 6. Connect the lead from the .015 cap. to the terminal which has been emptied by the removeal of the bus wire.
- 7. The mike cable is then connected to this terminal and Gnd.
- S. Readjust the deviation control (pot on top of chassis)

 Notes: This system has worked well with a crystal mike and an E-V


