
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

PHILA. CO. ARPSC AND THE VICTORY OVER POLIO IMMUNIZATION CAMPAIGN

At the request of the committee for the "Victory Over Polio", the Phila. Co. ARPSC participated in helping to immunize over 2,000,000 people with the Type III Sabin Oral Vaccine on Sunday, October 27 and November 3.

Since this was the first time that they were ever requested to offer assistance, there was a misunderstanding of just what their role would be on the first Sunday. They were under the impression that they were to have mobiles stationed at the distribution centers, and others at the chinics (194) throughout the city, and to pass along the information to the four distributors to deliver the vaccine as needed.

As it turned out, they were the sole distributors of the vaccine. As the mobiles pulled into the distributing centers, they were loaded up with supplies, and as landline calls were received by net control for additional supplies, mobiles were dispatched to the clinic. Those poor guys were all over the city. They had no street maps and each clinic had a number, no name or location, and net control had no idea of what the numbers meant: Confusion reigned, but being hams, they took it in their stride and did a bangup job. So much so, that they were asked to carry out the same duties the next Sunday.

This time they were supplied with maps, number, name and location of the clinics administered on Sunday, December 8 The city was also divided into four sections with certain mobiles handling one section instead of each one running all over the city.

We would like to point out here that the committee learned of the ham service through the publicity for SET in the newspaper.

We would also like to point out that not one word was mentioned in the newspaper regarding the participation of the hams in this great project, even though news releases were sent both before and after. The only inkling the public had of the hams part was when W3ELI, George and K3WEU, Paul told about it on the Red Benson radio program over WPEN. And then only the night owls heard it as they didn't get on the air until 1:30 A.M., Sunday, November 17.

Another mix-up that occured on October 27, was that the committee was under the impression that they would not need the hams until 1:00 P.M., based on the immunizations time-table of the Type/I vaccine. But, the public is fickle, and, even though the clinics opened at 11:00 A.M., by noon they were hollering for more supplies. Frankie got home from church at 10 after 12, grabbed a cup of coffee and half a sandwich and took-off. The next Sunday, November 3rd, they were requested to start at 11:00 A.M., the same time that the clinics opened.

When "Operation Victory Over Polio" net first went on, there was quite a bit of QRM, but hams, being the gentlemon'that they are, QSY'd as soon as roquested.

What was ironic about the whole situation is, that very few of the hams had a chance to get their own vaccine on the first Sunday, but they made sure they got it on the second Sunday.

We are very grateful to the hams, non members of Phila. Co. ARPSC, who volintegred their services. Amongh them being WZEIF, Jo; W3MVF, Dave; K3Q36, Bob and K3MSV, Jule, who served as monitoring stations.

The other monitoring stations were K3NUL, Clare: W3ISN, Bud and K3NSN, Charlie.

Other non-members volunterring their services were; K3GOZ, Herm and K3GQJ, Jack, who was just driving up Broad street, and hearing the need for help took the time to help....

Amateurs participating were; K3WEU M3ISN; K3DOH, and W3INW, net control stations. W3SAO, W3DJV . K3GAS, K3GQJ. K3ACR, K3DXC; K3JJZ; K3GFF; W3ELI; K3NSN; W3GIF; K3KDP; W3ZZI, W3SRU, K3GNJ, W3WUX, K3CEE, W3IRS, W2EIF, W3MVF, K3MSV, K3QJS, K3NUL and K3GOZ. One quarter of the operation was on ten meters while the majority was on six meters.



FCC's 'KILOCYCLE KOPS'

' Washington, Oct. 22.

There may be trouble ahead for global broadcasting if reports from FCC's "kilocycle bops" are any indication.

Commission's technical monitors disclosed that station interference takes places in strange ways and places.

A Coast broadcast station, for example, was troubled by clatter of telegraph signs and Voices from its station in Sydney, Australia. The kioloycle cops found the trouble in a Melbourne, Australia, station.

Interference to a Navy frequency was pinned to a station on the Brazilian Coast,

Bugs in another Navy outlet in Hawaii were traced to a French naval station in Algeria. Also in Hawaii, a commercial station was receiving interference from a like outlet in Colombia.

A radio press service in New York was hampered by an aeronautical station in Virginia. This time the source was found in a Tunisian commercial station.

On other fronts the kilocycle cops reported a California was hearing on her tv calls of "Help-can you help me?" FCC traced the call to a 13-year-old calling on a radio transceiver to his

In Valparaiso, Ind., tv viewers were complaining of increased interference. Root of the problem was a nearby university's neutron generator. The generator company sent a technician to the school who put the gizmo in proper condition.

MEMORIES OF A PRESS TELEGRAPHER:

THE ISLAND OF YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

By Maurice Siegel, retired press telegrapher who now lives in New Orleans.

In the late Twenties, when I was a member of that vanishing breed, the press telegrapher, nowspapers depended on telegraphic communication for their very existence. There must still be an old hand or bud around a cipy desk who occasionally recalls nostalgically the days when he worked the lobster trick on a paper. As he came into the editorial room in the cool, quiet early morning, there was nothing more reassur-ing than the staccate clicking of a telegraph sounder emanuating from the wire room. Teletypes were beginning to appear in newspaper offices, it is true, but the Morse operator was still the main link with the world. Although his days were numbered, it was the Morse telegrapher who manned his typewriter and key, who translated dots and dashes into the comedy and tragedy of our civilization.

At a main headquarters bureau, such as New York, Washington, Chicago, or San Francisco, a sending operator was linked by wires with the various bureaus and newspapers throughout the area of a particular press association. He sat in front of a typewriter (mill) and, with a telegraph sounder at his ear, typed on a "book" of five-sopy flimsy sheets interspersed with black carbons. In those days a press telegrapher was still of the elite. He considered himself, with justifiable pride, at the top of the craft; He could type fast and spell fluently, and he had a remarkable ability to translate what, to the run-of-the-mill Morse operator, sounded like nothing but strange gibberish. The sender used a form of shorthand that condensed words and phrases, and the receiver had to type out the words and phrases to make the story come out clear and understandable. And to put the story onto the pages of the book of flimsy correctly, it was necessary for him to keep "behind" the sender so that he could at the same time "read" the copy being sent and decipher the code. Both the sender and receiver were the possessors of an esoteric code called the Phillips Code. For instance, the sender might start

a story somewhat like this:
"CP Aug. 1 (AP)-Iw and tdy bit of1
xnl f state 5 Pot cou wd mk an andm.."
This may be a comowhat exeggrated. example, but it was, every unintelligible syllable of it, straight
Phillips Code and translated this way:
"Constantinople, Aug. 1 (AP)-It was
announced today by the official constitutional government of the state
that the president of the country
would make an announcement..."

These were, in fact, the first words I copied, or attempted to copy, when I broke in as a press telegrapher. The sender at the bureau headquarters had been apprised beforehand that an apprentice, or "lid", was on the receiving end and had slipped that "CP" at the beginning. I had no idea what it meant, and I got up from the mill crestfallen. I was later told about the hazing, but I never forgot how to spell Constantinople. Now, of course, Istanbul is its name and the Ottoman Empire has never been the same.

Each sender had certain peculiarities and quirks in his telegraphic "voice", and just by listening to a line or two of Morse, any receiver could immediately recognize the sender. By the way he sent out certain combinations of lettors, his "fist" was instantly revealed. I knew an operator who stammered in his speech and who did the same thing when sending on his instrument. Another, who stumbled over words beginning with a "G" when talking, did the same while sending.

I worked my way through Ohio State University as a press telegrapher and I thought I knew the Phillips Code. I was fär from sure of myself, but youth was dauntless and unafraind. Wire stories were written in a predictable style in those days-especially the AP stories. If you followed the story it was not too difficult to gather the gist of what was being sent and to transcribe it on your mill. remember watching in admiration as the old-timers dawdled in front of their mills, sometimes carrying on conversations and falling behind the sender for as much as two or three lines. Then they would hunt and peck with two trusty forefingers and come up with clear copy, exact down to the proper titles, names, dates, and punctuation.

There were many codes for commonplace phrases and words. In stories with a Washington dateline, for instance, there would occur phrases like SOW (Secretary of War), COW (committee of the whole), APNS COM (Appropriations Committee), SOC (Chamber of Commorce), and CGS (Congress), and HUR (House of Representatives) To save my soul, I cannot remember what the code for the Senate was, but surely there must have been a word for that august body. A typical lead from Washington might begin like this: "Ixu 5 Scotus wd and

a den to eng the xn." The receiving operator would hover momentarily over his keyboard and then his ringers would fly as he spelled out: "It is understood that the Supreme Court of the United States would announce a decision to change the Constitution."

Important events and famous and noterious names in the news were made part of the code as each one came into the headlines. POTUS was President of the United States, HDG was Harding, CJE was Coolidge, HVR was Hoover, but you had to follow the story because HVR also meant "However" DGR was the code for the lat imfamous Dillinger, and also, aptly enough, for "Danger". In interpretive or "think" pieces I especially like to come across GDC, BDH, and NWG- "On the contrary," "On the other hand", and "Notwithstanding".

Another code usage depended upon combinations of numbers. Here I want to set the record straight. Contrary to what many nowspapermon believe, they were not the first to use the numerals "30" to indicate the end of a story. Press and railroad telegrothers had been using "30" for years. It usually signified the closing of the wire, the end of the "trick", it meant simply goodnight. When time for lunch arrived, the sender announced "take 30", meaning lunch would be for thirty minutes. Porhaps, through osmosis, the deskmen took over the number.

Some of my readers may be wondering by this time about the reason for my title. Why "The Island of Yesterday Afternoon"?

Well, one day I was copying a story from Washington about a Congressional Committee that was looking into some matters concerning the mandated Pacific islands that the Allies had acquired from the defeated German Empire ofter World War I. I had been copying details pertaining to the distribution of the South Pacific groups of islands, the tiny dots on the vast ocean west of the Hawaiian Islands. The story was dull. My mind was on other things as I mechanically put down the story on book after book of flimsy. I was proud of my proficiency and knowledge of Phillips Code, and I felt like an old pro. The story ended. I was in the midst of copying a feature story when the takegraph editor of the News came into our noisy cubicle and asked, "what in the hell is this?" He pointed to a line in the Washington story, to 🗥 another. In all, there were exactly three references to "the Island of Yesterday Afternoon." There it was, right alongside beautiful Hawaii, Somnolent Guam, Fromantic Tahiti, sundrenched Papeete, and Polynesian Samoa. I looked at the flimsy sheet, and read it again: the Island of Yes-terday Afternoon. I recognized it as my own copy. Had I been dreaming?

Then I realized what had happened. had typed "the Island of Yesterday Afternoon" just as I had recéived it on the sounder. It was correct-except for a slight and terrible loss of memory. What I had put down as the island of yesterday afternoon should really have been transcribed as "the Island of Yap." Phillips Code for "yesterday əftərnoon" was YAP, just as YAM was "yesterday morning". Ard in my eagerness to show off my proficiency and knowledge of the code, I had mistaken a perfectly normal name like Yap for a certain time of day. The sender had prefixed the name of the island with the Morse symbol for stet, which meant the next word was to be written exactly as sent. He had taken it for granted that the receiving operators were intelligent and wide-awake citizens and would know where the Island of Yap was.

I sheepishly corrected the copy and soon afterward received some unwanted and derisive notoriety from my peers, who spread my fame throughout the length and breadth of the entire leased wore of the Associated Press.

Upon relection and after many years, though, I find myself thinking that the Island of Yesterday Afternoon may really have been just as appropriate. After all, that's when all these adventures happened—on a yesterday afternoon way, way back in my youth.

NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS

Tech - Nical - Topics

The R-48/TRC 8 receiver is widely used by the club members to monitor the club frequency of 221.4 mc. Some recent measurements made on this receiver may be of interest. A spurious signal has been observed on some of the modified receivers, particularly when tuning at the low end of the band. This signal manifests itself by a marked change in background noise, and a sharp die on the receiver meter. I found the cause or source of this spurious signal to be a weak oscillation in the receiver IF strip.

The IF frequency of the receiver is normally 28 mc., but most of the ones seen have the IF's aligned at about 27.5 mc. The eighth harmanic of 27.5 mc. is 220.0 mc! So, the cure is to stop the oscillation in the IF.

The fourth IF amplifier is the source of the trouble. The original screen bypass capacitor has a long ground return. Solder a .001 uf disc capacitor from the B+ end of the plate coil of the fourth stage to the ground lug at the tube socket. Add a 4.7 k resistor from ground to the junction of the 50 uuf capacitor and the detector transformer. If you have previously removed any of the 4.7 k resistors

loading the other stages, replace t

Now, repeak the IF stages with a signal generator at 28 mc., or olse on a signal on 221.4 mc. The results are gratifying, since all trace of the spurious signal will now be gone.

Here is a "Hint and Kink" for people who do not have a lot of meters.

Instead of cutting a hole in the panel to accomidate a meter, just make two holes about 14" apart and insert a red and a black jack; red for + and black for -. N



On the meter, bond $1\frac{1}{2}$ " lengths of #12 tinned wire to shape.



These will fit on meter terminals and bends "X" and "Y" should be 1½" apart.



Meter can now be plugged into Jacks. Make sure meter terminals do not touch panel.
