

"PASSOVER"

The freedom which Jews celebrate on Passover is a freedom of a special kind. In Jewish tradition, freedom, in the modern sense, is scarcely a virtue; at best, it is an opportunity.

If Israel had gone forth out of Egypt, but not accepted the Covenant at Sinai, it would have achieved liberation—release from bondage—but it would not have achieved freedom, in the Jewish sense of the term. For the only freedom, says Judaism, is the yoke of Divine Law. The only true independence is the apprehension of God in our private and national lives.

In Judaism, the story of the Exodus has long since been lifted out of a purely historical context. The Exodus, according to our tradition, involved both the patriarchs of the past and their children's children of the future. It validated the mission of the former and determined the destiny of the latter. It is this ideal Exodus that is colobrated in the traditional Seder service on the first two evenings of the festival.

Properly understood, the Seder coremony is no mere act of pious recollection, but a unique and inspired device for blending the past, present and future. In an ideal sense, all Israel went out of Egypt, and all Israel stood before Sinai.

"Every man in every generation," says a familiar passage in the Haggadah, "must look unto himself as if he personally had come forth out of Egypt. It was not our fathers alone that God redeemed, but ourselves did He redeem with them."

The Haggadah is, then, the script of a living drama, not the record of a dead event. When the Jew recites it, he is performing an act of personal identification. What the Seder Narrative relates is the whole story of how Israel moved progressively from darkness to light, from the ignorance and shame of idelatry to the glory of its mission,

Surf City, N.J., March 12--

The death of a man here Sunday was attributed today to electrocution. Surf City Police Chief, Frank Jones said Claude A. Danser, 23, of 20 Pine St., Mt. and discussion within the microwave industry.

Eight microwave bands up to 22 Sc are open to amateur use, and above 30 Sc it's still anybody's spectrum. Lack of equipment, rather than a shortage of frequencies, is restricting participation by amateurs. How then, might interested, promising students be given some practical experience in microwaves? We've looked at some tentative ideas and would like to pass them along for your reaction. For Example:

- . Industry, working with local secondary schools and colleges might make available (perhaps with tax advantages) obsolete equipment and help establish lab courses and extra-curricular programs built around the use of this equipment.
- . Alternatively, selected students could be invited to help out at the plant in maintainance, test and use of microwave hardware. A couple of bright young meter readers might prove useful for the overtime shift at the antenna range. Students would combine on-the- job training with direct in-

volvementin a hobby and further gain by association with professional microwave engineers.

- Military and other government instellations could organize local groups—perhaps along the lines of the present Military Affiliate Radio System, but on a more ambitious scale.
- For the do-it-yourself experimenter working under proper supervision, access to company junk heaps might provide many a useful microwave component.

None of these ideas is without fault or difficulty. There are problems—technical, financial, legal and organizational. But the microwave community might include men willing to turn their time and energy to working out a possible solution. We would like to hear from such men and provide a forum for discussion in this area.

Encouragement of microwave "hams" would help create a continuning reservoir of young men able and qualified for successful careers in our industry.

HAM RADIO OPERATORS HELP EXPEDITE CORNEAS TO BE USED IN TRANSPLANTS (Medical Tribuna - World Wide Report)

Iowa City - In five emergency cases in less than two months, a network of amateur radio operators in the Midwest has proved invaluable in expediting the delivery of eyes from eye banks to surgeons requiring them for corneal transplantations:

Seventeen ham radio operators participate in a voluntary effort-known as the Eyeball Network-to service 10 eye banks in a six state area that includes Illinois, Indiana, Towa, Missouri, Oklahoma and Nebraska.

The project, launched December 20. 1962, was conceived by Dr. A.E. Braley, head of the Department of Ophthalmology at the State University of Iowa Hospitals here, to provide a fast, efficient, economical means whereby surgeons could contact the eye banks in emergencies.

The amateur radio network idea occurred to him soon after the organization of a clearinghouse for 10 Midwest eye banks to provide a system to assure that eyes not needed at one eye bank could be utilized elsewhere. Headquarters for the clearinghouse is at the eye bank here at the State University of Iowa Hospitals.

Dr. Braley and another amateur operator, Ted Hunter, Associate Research Professor in Psychology, solicited the cooperation of operators in the vicinity of each of the 10 eyebanks. Each of the voluntary operators now tune in at seven o'clock each morning, from ... Monday through Saturday, for messages that need to be relayed to the eye

Recently, for example, a surgeon in Indianoplis informed his eye bank that he needed an eye for an energency corneal transplant operation, Or. Braley tol Medical Tribune. The next morning an amateur radio operator radioed the request, which headquarters here attempted to fulfill by flying the eye

from Cedar Rapids, he said.

Bad weather, however, would have meant a three-hour delay in the flight. A complete membership as of March I, 1963 relay of state patrol cars was organized and carried the eye to Chicago in time to catch a plane to Indianoplis.

NEW JERSEY NEWS OF THE EVENING BULL <u>LETIN, THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1963</u> NEW INSTRUMENT ALLOWS HEART CHECK BY PHONE

Levittown, Feb. 21--Major Eugene J. Paradis, of 145 Pennypack Drive, this week had his heart checked--over the

Paradis, a Marine who served in Korea and in the South Pacific during World War II, was one of four military men whose electrocardiograms were sent over phone wires from a center city location to Philadelphia General Hospital in Philadelphia.


And Paradis' heart, despite his 22 years of service in which he received nine battle stars, made a smooth recording over the lines.

The occasion was a demonstration of a recent Bell Telephone Co. Development called the "dataphone". It can relay heart beats for miles over phone wires.

The heart beats were sent from the office of the Heart Association of Southeastern Pennsylvania, supervised by Dr. George J. Nichols, health off-cer of the phone company, Dr. Semuel Bellet and Dr. Otto Mueller received the heart beat at the hospital,

Nichols envisions the instrument as a "first step toward mass screening for early detection of coronary artery disease" and as a means of sending electrocardiograms and electroencephalograms from outlying clinics and hospitals to medical centers in major cities.

Also having their heart beats transmitted were Lt. John Rohde, Lt. Joseph B. Amlong and Lt. Thomas Amlong, who plan a "Heart Fund" hike from Philadelphia to Valley Force and back tomorrow. The total distance is 50 miles.



The 50 mile radius is from Phila. City Hall (Geographical Center). If you live beyond this radius, you need only work 10 Pack Rats.

We have Pack Rate living beyond this radius, but you do not have to live 50 miles from a Pack Rat to count him.

If you live only 10 or maybe 3 miles from a Pack Rat, and yet you are farther than 50 miles from Phile. you only need ten for your certificate.

We hope this clarifies it for our friends in the New York, Northern New Jersey area.

If you work a Pack Rat mobile, and again fixed, they count as two contacts. (Personally, I don't think it fair, but I don't make the rules.)

Over 75 Certificates have been sent out.

On March 13 the Commission granted the League's request for relaxed mobile logging requirements, eliminating the need for separate time entries opposite the eall of each station worked. Under the new rules, effective March 21, an amateur may, at the first convient stopping point, list the starting and ending times of his mobile operation, together with a list of the stations worked during that interval. The date, band, mode of emmission, power and the like must still be entered in the log whenever ther is a change in this information. Further details will appear in May QST.
